John 10:1-21

The Beautiful/Good Shepherd

I. Slide1 Announce:

- A. Slide2-4 Larry: Stir. Volunteers. Int Day Of Unreached.

- C. Children at Risk cancelled next Sun for Fathers Day.

II. Slide6a Intro: The Beautiful/Good Shepherd

- A. A 450 sheep pileup created havok in a Turkish province. July 8, 2005. (AP)¹
 - First one sheep jumped to its death. Then stunned Turkish shepherds, who had left the herd to graze while they had breakfast, watched as nearly 1,500 others followed, each leaping off the same cliff, Turkish media reported. In the end, 450 dead animals lay on top of one another in a billowy white pile. Those who jumped later were saved as the pile got higher and the fall more cushioned, the *Aksam newspaper* said. [I think there were actually more than the 450 sheep dead, but the <u>shepherd</u> who was counting them, fell asleep :)]
 - a) We always hear, sheep are dumb animals (like story above). But sheep are actually surprisingly intelligent, with impressive memory and recognition skills. They have good hearing. Move uphill when disturbed. They have a flocking behavior. And sheep can recognize human faces & other sheep, for years.
- B. Read 10:1-21
- **C**. Slide6b I'd like to start with the end. Is Jesus *divine* or *deranged*? It's a question everyone of us have to answer this morning. (read 19-21) [*these words* were from 17,18 ie res]
- D. Slide7 Context: What is immediately before these statements of ch.10? [ch.9 *the man born blind*]
 - 1. Jesus became the door/entrance into eternal life for this former blind man.
 - 2. Jesus became also became his Good Shepherd. The Pharisees, who were called to be *shepherds* to God's people, were like thieves & robbers. They had no real concern for *the sheep of Israel*...especially *this poor blind sheep*.

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- a) Remember the religious leaders **excommunicated** the newly healed blind man attempting to *slam the door of God, in his face.*
- b) Little did they realize that they'd actually *freed him* from <u>their</u> *man-made house of hell* to find the **true Door** who opens heaven to us all.
- 3. This little parable seems to say: this is what I'm doing; this is what gives substance to my claim to be sent by God as Israel's true king. The fact that people are *hearing* Me and *following* Me notably the man born blind is the sign that God has sent me.
- E. In Jn10 we have 2 more implicit claims to deity, from Jesus: I Am the Door. I Am the Good Shepherd. A mixing of 2 metaphors.
 - 1. figure of speech (6) Illustration, allegory, parable. A story that can be interpreted to reveal a hidden meaning.
 - Though in the same chapter, we distinguish between them (because they don't mean the same thing) but never separate them (because they're so close to the other). [Here we have Jesus' final *public* address]

III. Slide8a HE OWNS THE SHEEP (3)

- A. He calls them His own, even before they *follow*.
- B. Few portraits of Jesus have more appeal than His role of *Shepherd*.
- C. Good Shepherd not good from just a merely moralistic standpoint, but it can also mean beautiful. It's about the sheer attractiveness of what, as the shepherd, he was doing. When he calls, people want to come. When they realize he has died for them, they want to even more. The point of calling Jesus 'the good shepherd' is to emphasize the strange, compelling power of his love. N.T. Wright, John 10
- D. Slide8b God's people are His flock.
 - 1. Ps.100:3 We are His people and the sheep of His pasture.
 - 2. Is.40:11 He will feed His flock like a shepherd; He will gather the lambs with His arm, & carry them in His bosom, & gently lead those who are with young.
 - 3. Ps.95:7 For He is our God, And we are the people of His pasture, And the sheep of His hand (or, the sheep under His care).

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- E. Slide9 Why does He compare us to sheep?
 - 1. We are prone to wander. (*All we like sheep have gone astray; We have turned, every one, to <u>his own way</u>)*
 - 2. We need a Shepherd to guide us. (like sheep do)
 - 3. Sheep flock together, so should we. (should be no lone wolves!)
- F. (3) Hear His voice listen attentively to & so to obey.
 - 1. They are listening for the one voice that matters, the voice they trust.
 - 2. Eg. Elephant & handler in Thailand. (whistle, stopped eating to follow)

IV. Slide10 HE LEADS THE SHEEP (3,4)

- A. Not like Western shepherds who follows behind...*driving, prodding, urging them forward*. But eastern shepherds **lead** their sheep, *they go before them, and the sheep follow after them*.
- B. (4) He brings out His own sheep, He goes before them a rebuke to the Pharisees who expelled the man born blind.

V. Slide11a HE PROTECTS THE SHEEP (1,5,12)

- A. He protects them from thieves, robbers, wolves, strangers, hired hands, etc.
 - 1. Steal, kill, destroy that's all our enemy & his minions are about.
 - 2. Jesus grants His sheep entrance into His fold. I Am the Door.
- B. I Am the Door? Strange upon first hearing...I'll show you...*I am the Window. I am the doorknob. I am the toaster.*
- C. There are 2 different types of sheep-folds. [communal & individual]
 - 1. **Communal** sheep-fold see vs.2,3. A walled in structure.
 - a) Shepherds would bring their flocks there at night & entrust them to the shepherd (porter/gatekeeper). The shepherd would return the next morning, **call** for his sheep, they would know his voice & come out.
 - 2. Individual sheep-fold see vs.7,9. An open air structure. Usually made of stones piled up in a circle, with 1 entrance where the shepherd would sit &

become its door. These were used in *the warm months* when the sheep could stay out on the hillsides.

- D. In & out to find green pasture (9) or, spiritual nourishment.
 - 1. Gatekeeper/shepherd/porter regulate the **coming** & **going** of sheep between the sheep pen & the pasture.
 - a) Sounds like the Fathers promise in Ps.121:8 *The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time forth and forevermore.*
 - 2. In and out. Egress and Ingress (exit & entry).
 - a) He goes in and out at his pleasure...*this is freedom*.
 - b) When he goes **in**, is not shut in like a **criminal**. When he goes **out**, he is not shut out like a **stranger**.
 - (1) If you went **in** and couldn't get **out**, that would be a prison.
 - (2) If you went **out** and couldn't get back **in**, you would be a stranger.
 - 3. This also speaks to your rod & your staff they comfort me.
 - a) The rod for *protecting* against when predators appear.
 - b) The staff for *directing*. (straight part) to *steer* sheep in the right direction when navigating streams. (the crook) to *rescue* wayward sheep. [which do you need?]
 - Saved (9) the entire process of *soul-health.* F.B.Meyer [In for fellowship, protection, sleep. Out for service]
 - a) It is He who gives *salvation, security, & satisfaction* to all who enter here.
- E. Slide11b In *Dante's Divine Comedy* he shares the supposed inscription at the entrance to Hell, *Abandon all hope ye who enter here*.
 - 1. Does that sign hang anywhere in your life?
 - 2. Any situation in your life that seems hopeless?
 - a) Does it hang over a **bottle of alcohol** that seems impossible to walk away from at night?
 - b) Does it hang over every meal with your eating disorder?
 - c) Does it hang over your **unemployment**, thinking you'll never find work?
 - d) Does it hang over your marriage that constantly feels *it's over*?

- e) Where have you *abandoned all hope*?
- 3. Slide11c We can affix a different sign at the entrance to this new door, *Abandon your-self ye who enter here*, or *Gain all hope ye who enter here*.
 - a) Enjoy all HOPE...those who enter here. (through the Jesus Door)

VI. Slide12a HE GIVES LIFE & SATISFACTION TO HIS SHEEP (10b)

- A. Because He gave <u>His</u> life, He is able to give life.
- B. See we desire more than just being *safe* from the thieves, robbers, strangers & hirelings.
 Which are the *false Messiahs, false prophets, Pharisees & Scribes, the religious leaders of ch.9*, who were more interested in fleecing the sheep than in *guiding, nurturing & guarding* them.
 - 1. See we don't just want to *survive* we want to *thrive* at every level of our being
- C. Slide12b Oh, let us not be content until our life has become *abundant life*. Because *our life, cost the Shepherd <u>His</u> life.*
 - 1. Jesus says, My abandoned life for your abundant life.
 - 2. We want life. But we want *more than* mere life. We want abundant life... *Overflowing* life. *Deep* life. *Weighty* life. *Joyful* life. We were made for this.
- D. Christians should have: such abundant life that their circumstances shouldn't be able to overcome them. such abundant life that in poverty they are rich. such abundant life that in sickness they are in spiritual health. such abundant life that in disappointments they are full of triumph. such abundant life that in death they are full of glory.

VII.Slide13 HE KNOWS HIS SHEEP (14)

- A. Eastern Shepherds *knew* all the particulars of each of His sheep...*history, defects, temper,* & *tastes*. [God *knows* you so intimately]
 - Frédéric Louis Godet observes (a Swiss Protestant theologian, 1800's) the word to know does not mean: I distinguish them from the rest of the Jews. This word is much more profound. Jesus penetrates with the eye of His loving knowledge the entire interior being of <u>each</u> of the sheep, and perfectly

discerns all which He possesses in them.

VIII.Slide14 HE DESIRES ONE FLOCK (16)

- A. Many folds (pens), but only one flock, one Shepherd.
 - 1. Eph.2:11,13,16 Therefore, remember that formerly you who are <u>Gentiles</u> by birth...but now in Christ Jesus you who <u>once were far away</u> have been **brought near** through the blood of Christ...to reconcile **both** of them to God through the cross.
- B. Other sheep I have The language is sovereign & prophetic.
 - 1. Gentiles? Yes. Family members, co-workers, friends, Rohingya & Hani. Those who are not following the Shepherd yet.
 - 2. What other sheep does He want to lead to Himself, through you?

IX. Slide15a HE GIVES HIS LIFE FOR THE SHEEP (11,15,17)

- A. In the OT the <u>sheep</u> died for the shepherd. In the NT Christ is the <u>Shepherd</u> who dies for the sheep. (not a *dangerous possibility*, it's His vocation)
- B. The story of *the Good Shepherd* is not the tragic story of a **Victim** but the tremendous story of a **Victor**. One who *voluntarily* laid down His life on our behalf.
- C. Slide15b Christ as the Good Shepherd gives His life on the cross (Ps. 22).
- D. Christ as the Great Shepherd, He cares for the sheep (Ps.23 & Heb.13:20).
- E. Christ as the Chief Shepherd, He will come again in glory for His sheep (Ps.24 & 1Pet. 5:4)
 - 1. The goodness of this Shepherd abides in the fact that He does not spare Himself in looking after the sheep.
 - 2. In vs.18 it speaks about both His death & resurrection (longer discussion in Jn.11).
- F. Yes, this is a 2000 year old story...but it's a story of a Shepherd so supremely good that *nothing* stood in the way of His love for His sheep...not even His own life.
 - 1. Do you hear the voice of this Shepherd, calling you this morning?
 - 2. Are you ready to follow this Shepherd?
