The Timing & Tears of God

II. Slide11 INTRO: The Timing & Tears of God

- A. Of the *greatest cultural divides* in today's world is <u>the different ways</u> in which we do **funerals**. I've seen them in many countries...most recently with Andrew in **Kathmandu**.
 - 1. Slide12 We visited The **Pashupati** Temple's open Crematorium.
 - 2. Dates back centuries (400bc). It is believed that a Hindu cremated <u>here</u> would be <u>reborn as a Human</u> in his next birth.
 - 3. The entire process takes 3 to 4 hours, and the ashes join the river **Bagmati**, which eventually leads to the **Ganges** river in India. [usually just 3-5 hours after death]
 - a) It's all part of the strange business of *being human* that when we are with *very sad people* their sadness infects us even if we don't share their particular grief.
 - b) Slide13 Psychologists point out that, we all carry deep griefs of one sort or another, and these <u>come to the surface</u> when we are with others who have more immediate reason for sorrow.

- B. Death, the last thing we want to talk about. It makes us uncomfortable, awkward, painful, so emotional. We've medically learned to postpone it, even tame its violence, but death is still there waiting for us. Death always waits.
 - It comes after Christian Relief Workers persecuted for their faith. It comes after Family & Friends. It comes after Celebrities (we await to hear why Tyler Skaggs, the Angels Pitcher in his prime, 27 yrs old, died in his hotel room. Foul play ruled out. Suicide ruled out. We await the autopsy).
 - 2. None of us are *immune* from *difficulties* in this life, or *tragedy*, *illness* or death.

III. Slide14a THE TIMING OF GOD (1-16)

- A. This is Jesus 7th & last & most spectacular sign in the gospel of John.
 - 1. It is climatic because it illustrates beyond doubt Jesus' power to give life & triumph over death.
- B. Slide14b Jesus gives life only by giving His life.
 - 1. The **raising** of Lazarus leads directly to the **death** of Jesus (see vs.53)
 - 2. It is in this sense that the illness/death of Lazarus is for the glory of God (4).
 - a) Slide14c Jonathan Edwards said, The object of all things is **God's glory**, & when <u>God gets</u> **His glory**, God's <u>people get</u> their joy.
 - 3. Wait go back. Who gets the glory? (note: both Father & Son). What are they receiving glory through? (Lazarus' death)
 - a) I don't believe that God only desires to receive glory through this one man's death.
 *Can we at least ask...*God how will You receive glory in my life today? In my illness today. And in my death tomorrow?
 - 4. How can I bring Glory to God? Jesus Jn.17:4, *I brought glory to You here on earth by completing the work you gave me to do.* Jesus honored God by *fulfilling his purpose* on earth. We honor God the same way. When anything in creation fulfills its purpose, it brings glory to God. **Birds** bring glory to God by flying, chirping, nesting, and doing other bird-like activities that God intended. Even the lowly **ant** brings glory to God when it fulfills the purpose it was created for. God made **ants** to be **ants**, and he made **you** to be **you**. St. Irenaeus said, *The glory of God is a human being fully alive!*

- C. **The Setting:** In a *sleepy little hamlet* named Bethany 2 miles outside of Jerusalem, where Jesus loved to get R&R at his friends house: *Mary, Martha, & their brother Lazarus*.
 - 1. It was His *surrogate home* for Him in the south.
 - 2. Note who's village it was (the village of Mary, vs.2) [next ch tells her anointing story]
 - 3. Note who He loved (Martha, vs.5) [Maybe u relate more to being a Martha]
- D. (6) God waits He received the emergency 9-1-1 come quickly appeal, from best friends, so he stayed at *Extended Stay* 2 more days. (didn't mention it to his disciples. didn't make prep to go. didn't send a message back we're on our way. He just stayed. And Mary/Martha watched their brother die) Was he too busy? Was He attending to other matters of greater importance? No!
 - 1. *In times of crisis* its essential we understand some important facts about time & perspective.
 - 2. Because if you've been a Christian any amount of time you know, w/o a shadow of a doubt *God is always late!*...according to our standards :)
 - a) Slide14d Regarding Time: Our Lord is *never* late. He often delays His response, but is *never* late. His watch is merely set to a different timetable, calibrated to matters of eternal rather than *temporal* consequence.¹ [God's delays are <u>not</u> His denials]
 - b) Slide14e Regarding Perspective: We can adopt either a human or a divine outlook.
 - (1) Human perspective focuses on the urgent & blurs the important.
 - (2) **Divine perspective** factors **eternity** into the mysterious equations of life
- E. God's timing God was orchestrating an incredible moment & needed to set the stage.
 - And since the corpse must be center stage before this drama can begin, Jesus must wait until Lazarus <u>dies</u> before He can make His entrance. But Mary & Martha can't see backstage in heaven.
 - a) All they can see is an expansive, **black curtain** drawn across their lives. They sit at home, despondent, as in an **empty theater**.

IV. Slide15 THE TEARS OF GOD (17-44)

- A. Christ's arrival sparks some reactions in Mary & Martha. We note some **similarities** & some **contrasts**.
- B. In vs.20 we see the contrasts: Martha ran to meet; Mary sat in the house.
 - 1. Every family seems to have an **activist** & a **contemplative**.
 - a) The Activist has to do something. *He's coming, I'll run to him. I'll do all the house work, you just sit there Mary.*
 - b) The **Contemplative** says, *I'll just sit here & pray, ponder, think, cry, study, journal, I'll just feel this for awhile,* says **Mary**.
 - 2. Important: *They grieve & mourn differently*...& thats perfectly ok by Jesus. He meets them right where their personality takes them.
- C. In verse 21 & 32 we see the **similarity** of their initial greetings.
 - 1. Although their **words** are the same, their **posture** is not.
 - Martha runs to him, active & erect. Mary falls at His feet, passive & prostrate.
 Martha said them to His face. Mary cried them at His feet.
 - a) Here's the noted difference...**Martha** needed *Intellectual* propping up. **Mary** needed *emotional* support.
 - b) Martha needed to know that Jesus was *in control*.
 - c) Mary needed to know that Jesus *cared*.
 - 3. How did Jesus handle both of these friends?
 - a) He met each sister were she was, whether standing or prostrate; whether needing intellectual or emotional support.
 - b) One evoked theological truths & promises; the other evoked tears.
 - 4. When my **mother** died when I was 21, & still had 2 younger sisters at home, I approached Jesus like *Martha*, desiring **intellectual** answers, Why???
 - 5. When my father died I just needed emotional support from Jesus like Mary.
 - a) God is in control & He cares.
- D. Many Christians often feel that *bringing glory to God* means putting on a happy face no matter what is happening in our lives.

- If we're sad, angry, confused, or hurting, we somehow feel that if we don't have these difficult feelings wrapped up neatly in a moments time, we've betrayed the faith & put a blot on our testimony to Jesus.
- 2. But, not once did Jesus tell anyone, Stop crying! or How dare u question Me.
- 3. When you **grieve**, when you're **confused**, even when you're **angry**, don't try to *hide your feelings* from God & pretend everything's alright.
- E. Slide16 We also must learn to take our if's to Jesus (21)
 - 1. How broad the blame we place on **if's** little shoulders.
 - a) Slide17a If only we hadn't moved here. If only I hadn't married him/her. If only I hadn't listen to her/him. If only we hadn't invested in that Ponzi scheme.
 - b) If only he hadn't stepped out in front of that car. If only she passed that test. If only they left an hour later. What are your *if only's*? [Take em to Jesus like Mary/Martha did]
 - c) We all know the sickening sense of wanting to *turn the clock back*. That's what <u>movies</u> are made, like *Back to the Future* [where, if you could change something in the previous generation, it will mean **now** everything in the present, and the future can be different] (time machine from modified DeLorean. Marty, Doc, Lorraine & George, Biff. Marty accidentally prevented his parents from meeting by saving George (dad) from an oncoming car, he must find a way to introduce George to Lorraine (mom) or he will be erased from existence)
 - Slide17b Jesus deal with Martha's *if only* statement. He explains, instead of looking at the **past**, he invites her to look to the **future**. Then, having look to the **future**, He asked her to imagine that the **future** is suddenly brought **forwards** into the **present**.
 - a) He points her to the **future**. *Your brother will rise again*. Martha believes this, but her flat response in vs.24 shows that it isn't at the moment...very comforting. [but she wasn't prepared for Jesus's response]
 - b) The **future** has burst into the **present**. The Resurrection has come forward from *the end of time* into *the middle of time*. *I <u>am</u> the resurrection & the life...not I <u>will be</u>...*

- 3. Resurrection isn't just a doctrine. It isn't just a future fact. It's a person, and *here He is standing in front of Martha, teasing her to make the huge jump of trust and hope.*
- 4. Slide17c He is challenging her, urging her, to exchange her *if only* for an *if Jesus*.
- 5. If Jesus is who she is coming to believe He is. If Jesus is the Messiah, the Promise One, the One who was to come into the world. If Jesus is God's own Son. If Jesus is *resurrection-in-person*, *life-come-to-life*. wright
 - a) The story breaks off at this point, keeping us in suspense, while Martha goes to get her sister. Maybe it's God giving us space to think the same questions thru ourselves?
- F. Slide18a What an incredible Savior. Weeping not just *for* us in our <u>sin</u>, but *with* us in our <u>suffering</u>.
 - So strange, One with absolute power would surrender to so small an army as tears? But He does!² [*He has borne our griefs & carried our sorrows.* Is.53:4]
 - a) Ken Gire, *And*, for a beautifully tender moment, we are given the privilege to glimpse one of the most provocative embraces between **deity** & **humanity**.
 - 2. Thank you Jesus, for giving **dignity** to our grief & **freedom** to our emotions.
 - 3. Thank you Jesus, for the **beautiful tribute** that tears are to the dead, telling them they were **loved** & **will be missed**.
 - 4. Thank you Jesus, you know what it's like to lose someone you love.
 - 5. Thank you Jesus, you know how I feel.
 - 6. Thank you Jesus, you've enabled me to **weep** with **those who weep**.
 - a) *Help me to <u>feel</u>* the **pain** they feel, the **uncertainty**, the **fear**, the **heaviness**, the **regret**, the **despondency**.
 - b) *Help me to <u>share</u>* with those who cry out, *Lord, if You had been there... & help them to see* that You were there, weeping with them.

- 7. Oh Lord, help us to put away our high-and-dry pictures of who You are and replace them with pictures in which You cry with the world's crying...that's when we discover what the word <u>God</u> really means. N.T. Wright
- G. Contrast: *Weep* (33) the wailing of mourners, to *Jesus wept* (35) implies the silent tears of sympathy.
 - 1. But note vs.33,38 He was deeply moved. *lit.* He was enraged in spirit & troubled Himself.
 - a) As if to say... *I hate death*. *I hate what sin has done to My creation*. *I hate the distress to mankind*. *I hate to watch my children grieve so intensely*.
 - 2. Oh what grief was stirred within Jesus' heart, by the tears of Mary & the crowds tears (33).
- H. (41,42) He doesn't pray that he will now have the **power** to raise Lazarus. He **thanks** the Father that *He has* <u>heard</u> Him. [Heard him? Yes, prob the 2 day time of *waiting*. Jesus, exploring the Fathers will in that intimacy & union which He had with Him]
- I. (43) Lazarus come out Augustine, *They had to say <u>his name</u> otherwise He would have emptied the graveyard*.
- J. LESSONS LEARNED:
- K. Slide18b When delay occurs, God has a better time & a better way.
- L. When **death** occurs, God has a **better plan** & a **better purpose**.
- M. It revealed Jesus is who He said He was...the Resurrection & the life. But it revealed something else. *The Timing & Tears of God*.
 - Now which do you say is more incredible? A man who raises the dead...or a God who weeps? What do you find more amazing? The power of Jesus or the emotions of Jesus?
