# **Prodigal King**

#### I. Slide1,2 Announce:

- A. Read the intro to *The Ragamuffin Gospel*.
- B. Prayer: Lord your *gospel of grace* calls us to <u>see</u> the *everyday mystery of intimacy* with **You** God, instead of seeking for miracles & visions. *You desire us!*

#### II. Intro:

- A. Slide3We have all seen idyllic portraits of the supposed *First Thanksgiving* in 1621.
  - 1. Pilgrims and Native Americans gathered together, **feasting** on the bounty of the land, **forging** alliances of peace, and giving **thanks** for the blessings of life
  - 2. Yet, just a generation later colonists and natives found themselves at war with each other. Many colonists and Native Americans feared each other, and tribe after tribe would be forced from their land through unjust transactions, eventually relegated to impoverished reservations in unwanted lands. How quickly the tide can turn!
    - a) With the rise of King Manasseh, the tide turned quickly in Judah as well.
      - (1) After 29 years under godly Hezekiah, Manasseh took the throne and plunged the land into incredible wickedness, reversing everything Hezekiah had done.
      - (2) Manasseh was not only the most wicked king of Judah, he was more wicked than pagan nations.
- B. Slide4 Wicked king Ahaz fathered godly Hezekiah. Godly Hezekiah fathered evil king Manasseh. Evil king Manasseh *turns into a good king* and fathers the bad king Amon. Amon the wicked king fathered the godly king Josiah.
  - 1. 2 years into Hezekiah's 15 yr extension...Manasseh was born.
    - a) He had the **genes**, the **finances**, even the **lineage** (Mt.1:10 Jesus' geneol).
  - 2. Manasseh began his reign wicked but ended with repentance. Josiah sought the Lord early but ended his life disobeying.

- 3. Evil Manasseh got to reign for **55 years**, the **longest** of any king of Judah or Israel. [Yet Manasseh has been called *the Nero of Palestine*]
  - a) People who claim to see clear patterns in history or who locked divine providence into a fixed formula must keep this in mind...God's ways are not our ways; He is free to work as He chooses. Warren Wiersbe
- 4. You and I can do very little regarding world affairs, but we can **pray** for those in authority, and be faithful to **obey** our God.

#### III. Slide5 CHIEF OF SINNERS (1-9)

- A. Q: How would you sum up in your own words *Mannaseh's flagrant idolatry*?
- B. How bold he was in *idolatry*. He must of hated the 1st 2 commandments.
- C. (5) All of the host of heaven The sun, moon, stars, and planets.
  - 1. The book of 2 Kings 1st mentions this kind of idolatry, called *astral worship*, in the list of Israel's sins.
  - 2. Biblical law expressly forbids such worship (Deut 4:19).
  - 3. Slide6 Royal Seals of Judah. The center of the handle is a winged sun-disk.
- D. Slide7 (6) Made his son pass through the fire Worshipped Moloch (Sun God).
  - Required newborn babies as living sacrifices. The arms were heated until they
    glowed and babies were placed in the arms. A fire pit was built under the arms
    to catch and cremate the bodies. Priest beat on drums to keep the fathers from
    hearing the death cries.
- E. Asherah idolatry & immorality go together.
  - 1. In rejecting God, there is the embracing of the *Syrian Venus*. Which let loose of sin pouring over the land of Judah.
- F. He *carried his sacrilege* right into the precincts of the holy temple. (4,5,7)

### IV. Slide8a JUDGEMENT (10-18)

- A. JUDGMENT BEGINS IN THE HOUSE OF THE LORD (10-15)
- B. (10-16) Because Judah returned to the kind of sin that caused God to destroy the Northern kingdom, it too would be destroyed. [reaping the bitter harvest of your sins]

- C. (13a) The 1st part of this verse means **Jerusalem** will receive the same measure of judgement as **Samaria** & the house of **Ahab**.
- D. (13b) The city of Jerusalem is situated on the hill, which is surrounded by hills on every side. When viewed from a distance, Jerusalem looked to be in the middle of **a bowl** with the encircling hills forming its rim.
- E. Slide8b Think about it... Hosea, Joel, Nahum, Habakuk, Isaiah lived & prophesied during his reign. Do you think that weighs in on the judgment against him?
- F. OH, IT CAN GET WORSE? (16-18)
- G. Manasseh also destroyed the word of God. Every copy found was consigned to the flames. But when Josiah, Manasseh's grandson came to the throne, a copy of it was found in the Temple. All The Men of the Bible (22:8)

#### V. Slide9 AMON & JOSIAH (19-26)

A. (19-22) Amon *followed* his father in his sins but not in his repentance.

## VI.Slide10 GRACE IN FULL BLOOM (2 Chron.33:10-13)

- A. Manasseh eyes were opened to his sinful condition. He sobbed out the misery of his helpless & cowardly, spineless soul.
- B. Slide11 What brought this about? *Affliction* to the rescue.
  - 1. Ps.119:67 Before I was afflicted I went astray, But now I keep Your word.
  - 2. Ps.119:71 It is good for me that I have been afflicted, that I may learn Your statutes.
  - 3. Ps.119:75 *I know, O Lord, that Your judgments are right, And that in faithfulness You have afflicted me.* [See what started *the prodigal son's* journey home, Lk.15:14]
    - a) In the prison house of Babylon...Manasseh prayed.
    - b) Ps.51:17 *The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit, A broken and a contrite* (expressing pain or sorrow for sins) *heart These, O God, You will not despise.*
    - c) Slide12a God graciously received this *prodigal king*.
- C. How quickly God heard him, and how incredible was his restoration.

- 1. Slide12b He is not only set free, but actually restored to his kingdom and established on his throne. [There is much hope for us all in this]
  - a) If we truly repent of our sins, we shall be **forgiven**, and not only forgiven but **restored** again to our kingdom.
  - b) God not only casts away our sins but restores our soul.
  - c) You cannot doubt God's grace in your life if you catch a glimpse of this godly-reared, apostate, idolatrous, devilish, stricken, humbled, repentant Manasseh
- D. Slide13 Who in your life has sinned *too far* for you to forgive? *Do they compare to Manasseh?*
- E. Maybe **you** are that prodigal tonight?
  - 1. You belong to the brotherhood of the bedraggled, beat-up, & burnt-out.
  - 2. You may feel like a charred log in a fireplace, totally drained of energy, & unable to light a fire in yourself.
    - a) Don't try to feel anything, think anything, or do anything.
    - b) Slide14 It is not yours to open a **rose bud** into a **blossom**. *You'll only ruin it*. Your touch soils it. You'll only tear its petals to pieces.
      - (1) He who opens the bud does it simply!
  - 3. To be alive is to be broken. And to be broken is to stand in need of grace.
    - a) Do you need His grace tonight?
